The Appeal Committee will continue to exercise their discretion under Section 9.6(b) of the *Frog Lake First Nations Election Code* to schedule appeal hearings after the appeal filing period (May 26th) has expired. The hearing for this appeal will take place in person. The date, time, location and the manner in which the appeal hearing participants can present their evidence will be set out in a further notice.

I, Esther Maria Moyah, of FROG LAKE, Alberta, MAKE OATH AND SAY THAT:

I, and Ruby Stanley and Carlos Stanley were the individuals counting the ballots for the positions of 6 (six) Councillors for the Frog Lake First Nations Election held on April 26, 2023. I am appealing the election results as per the following section of the Frog Lake First Nations Election Code which states: Section 9.3 Post Election and other Appeals, specifically (a) Grounds of Appeal (i) After Election Day, an Elector may appeal the results of the Election if the Elector believes on reasonable and probable grounds that: (B) there was a violation of this Election Code or the Candidate Campaign Code of Conduct that would have directly affected the outcome of the Election.

GROUND 1: COUNTING OF ELECTRONIC VOTES

Section 8.6(a) of the Frog Lake First Nations Election Code (hereafter FLFNS) states: "Immediately upon the close of all Polling Stations, the Electoral Officer and/or Polling Clerks will count the ballots from all Advance Polls and Electronic Polls, in the presence of at least one Elector, and any Candidates and appointed Scrutineers who wish to attend and are physically present"

Upon completion of counting all the physical votes, I asked the Polling Clerk about whether we were going to count the electronic votes for the (six) Councillor positions. She stated that since the electronic votes were on computer, it was much easier for her to do it herself. And proceeded to do just that. Electronic voting took place on April 23, 2023, and April 26, 2023, from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. We did not count any votes for the ballots that were submitted electronically for the 6 (six) Councillor positions. We did not see any of the ballots that were cast, nor did we know how many votes each Councillor Candidate received. The Polling Clerk did all the tallying of all the votes herself and did not reveal any results to us. The comments and actions taken by the

Polling Clerk breached s. 8.6(a) of the FLFNS Code, specifically by not having at least one elector and/or Candidate and Scrutineers present in the counting of the electronic ballots for the 6 (six) Councillor positions as that required by this section.

GROUND 2: INSTRUCTIONS AND NOTIFICATIONS FOR ELECTRONIC VOTING

Section 8.5.3 (b) of the FLFNS Election Code states: "The Electoral Officer must ensure that instructions for electronic voting are provided to Electors at least fourteen (14) days before the earliest date on which a vote which may be cast on the electronic voting system."

Some of the off-Reserve eligible Band member electors that I talked to conveyed to me that they did not even know they could electronically vote on the dates specified on the FLFNS App or on the website. Neither did they received anything by mail notifying them that electronic voting will take place on Sunday April 23rd and April 26th, 2023, both days from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. Nor were they given the 14 days required notification. The section is silent on how the Electoral Officer may use other means to provide the instructions for electronic voting to FLFNS electors. It was only through communication with me that they learned that they could vote electronically vote on these dates. Thus, by not providing the instructions for electronic voting to all eligible electors and by not giving the 14 days notification, the Electoral Officer breached these necessary requirements as that set out under section 8.5.3(b). Although One Feather posted this information online, there's still several of our Band Members who have no access to any technological services or have limited access to such systems. And even though there was no requirement for the Electoral Officer to physically mail the electronic voting instructions and notification they could have at least done so or consider doing it, as we live in a remote community. Although the FLFNS Election Code provides for mail-in ballots, it is left up to the FLFNS Elector to make a request to the Electoral Officer by filling out a Request for Mail-in Ballot form as per section 8.5.4(a)(i) or just contacting the Electoral Officer directly (s. 8.5.4(a)(ii). But once again, all this information was provided on the FLFNS App or Website and as stated earlier, some people do not have access to online technological services.

Therefore, by the Electoral Officer relying on only online services to provide important nomination and election information to all eligible FLFNS electors on how to electronically vote, this prevented some people, both on and off-Reserve to cast their votes. Thus, this practice could have seriously affected the total count of votes because some people did not have the means to vote online electronically. Or they did have the technological services but did not have the instructions on how to vote electronically and were not notified of the dates when to vote electronically.

GROUND 3: ELECTRONIC VOTING IDENTIFICATION

Section 8.5.3(c)(vi) of the FLFNS Election Code provides: "The electronic voting platform chosen by FLFNS must: (vi) require an Elector to verify their identity to the satisfaction of the Electoral Officer

In some cases, the only identification required of an eligible voter who voted online electronically was their status number. They were not even asked to provide a digital copy of their status card that has a picture ID that proves who they are. Thus, the Electoral Officer breached the requirement to verify sufficient and proper identification of an eligible elector. Just asking for a status number and not the whole card is not sufficient to satisfy the authenticity of the identity of the voter. Anyone could have used someone's status number to vote. We know there is a common practice for people in Frog Lake to borrow one another's status number. Further, a non-Band member could have easily voted using someone else's status number to do so. Thus, the requirement of picture identification was not properly monitored by the Electoral Officer of One Feather; therefore violating s. 8.5.3(c)(vi) of the FLFNS Election Code which could have affected the final tally of votes of the election.

GROUND 4: SECURITY OF THE POLLING STATION DURING VOTE COUNT.

Section 6.6 (a)(i)(II) of FLFNS Election Code states: "The Electoral Officer is empowered to ensure the security of each Polling Station by: (i) removing any individual from a Polling Station who: (II) interferes with the ability of the Electoral Officer to administer an Election; and (iv) requesting assistance from law enforcement, security, or other appointed persons to ensure the integrity of a Polling Station, Electors, Candidates, staff and other persons during the conduct of an Election"

The security and integrity of the Polling Station was seriously compromised during the counting of votes. There were a great number of individuals who were hovering and mulling around our table as we were recording the votes for each Councillor candidates. I am not certain if all these people were appointed Scrutineers or just spectators. There were several people going live on Facebook. Some of them doing close-up shots as we were recording the votes of each Councillor Candidate on the tally sheets. It was very noisy and at times hard to hear the name the Polling Clerk was calling. Also, it was difficult to ascertain at times whether they were only 6 (six) candidates selected as I never heard the Polling Clerk say "okay there's 6 candidates" nor ever heard her count them out loud. She just started calling the names right away, very quickly. And we, the tally recorders, were too busy checking off the name of the candidate called, to even pay attention if there was a total of 6 candidates on the ballot. The reason why this is important is because the Election Code states that if more than 6 candidates are selected, the ballot is considered spoiled. An eligible elector can select 6 Councillor Candidates or less, but no more than 6. I believe this chaotic environment hindered the Polling Clerk and us 3 (three) individuals who were tallying the Councillor votes, from performing our duties in an efficient and effective manner. By not properly monitoring the polling Station environment, the Polling Clerk was negligent in her duty to ensure the integrity of the counting of votes and administering the Election in an efficient and professional manner as that required by the FLFNS Election Code. Further, this chaotic environment created a risk for miscalculation of the final tally of all votes. **Section 6.6(a)(iv)** of the FLFNS Election Code empowers the Electoral Officer to remove any individual or individuals that interferes with her ability to perform his/her duties to properly conduct the Election and anyone that undermines the security of the Polling Station. But she chose not to exercise her authority by asking assistance from the Security Personnel that were there; thereby, breaching **section 6.6 (a)(i)(ii) and (iv)** of the FLFNS Election Code.

GROUND 5: APPOINTMENT OF SCRUTINEERS

Section 8.1 of the FLFNS Election Code provides for Candidates' Scrutineers and it states: (a) A Candidate may appoint a maximum of ten individuals as Scrutineers; (b) A letter naming and confirming the appointment of each Scrutineer, signed by the Candidate, must be provided to the Electoral Officer prior to Election Day; (d) A Candidate shall be entitled to assign a maximum of two Scrutineers at each Polling Station at any given time; (j) Scrutineers shall not interfere with the operation of any Polling Station; and (k) The Electoral Officer may direct or remove a Scrutineer who, at the sole discretion of the Electoral Officer, interferes with the operation of the Polling Station.

Section 8.1 allows for the appointment of Scrutineers by any Candidate running for office, both as Chief or Councillor, on election day. The main duty of a Scrutineer is to observe the conduct of the Polling Station and to ensure the Election is being done in a fair and equitable manner. Specifically, a Scrutineer can raise objections to the Electoral Officer on things like the handling or counting of ballots, eligibility of an Elector to vote and any other conduct which he/she thinks violates the FLFNS Election Code (see section 8.1 (e)(i)(ii) (iii)). Although this section allows for the appointment of 10 (ten) individuals as Scrutineers, only two Scrutineers can be at a Polling Station at any given time during Election Day. Also, a letter must be submitted by a Candidate to the Electoral Officer prior to Election Day, naming and confirming the appointment of each Scrutineers. I have no knowledge or have no evidence of a letter that was submitted by a Candidate, if any, to One Feather naming who the Scrutineers were. Only One Feather has that and knows about such information. The only reason why I chose it as one of my grounds for appeal is to determine which people that were there during the counting of votes were the Scrutineers for the Candidates. And, to find out whether all the other people that were there, needed to be there. It was a very chaotic environment at the Polling Station during the counting of the votes as that described under my Section 5: Ground 4: Security of the Polling Station (see above). The chaos created by people mulling and talking around our table and people doing live Facebook viewings while we were recording our votes was very distracting. and in my opinion, a very unprofessional way to conduct an election. Section 8.1 states that Scrutineers shall not interfere with the operation of a Polling Station, and if so, the Electoral Officer has the power to remove that Scrutineer from the Polling Station if that should occur. But at this point it is hard to determine who the Scrutineers were and whether they were responsible for causing some of the chaos. But the responsibility lies on the Electoral Officer to conduct the election in a professional manner, as that is the practice in Off-Reserve Elections. The Polling Clerks overlooked some of the rules and requirements set out under the FLFNS Election Code, and in some cases, did not follow or even enforce them as that empowered of them to do so. Thus, they were negligent in their duties as that required of them under FLFNS Election Code.

GROUND 6: IMPROPER PROTECTION AND MAINTAINING OF BALLOTS AND TALLY SHEET

Section 6.4 Responsibilities of the FLFNS Election Code states: The Electoral Officer is responsible for managing and executing all pre-electoral, electoral and post-electoral processes and procedures included in this Election Code including but not limited to: (a) (iii) protecting and maintaining ballots, the List of Electors and all other documents and information relating to an Election; (vii) performing all duties outlined within this Election Code.

There was an overall total of 1,071 votes cast, out of 2,335 eligible voters on the FLFNS Voters List created by One Feather. At the closing of the polls, the box for the Councillor ballots was moved over to the table we were sitting at. We watched the Polling Clerk opened the box and emptied the whole box of ballots onto our table. We started to take each ballot, without looking at it, and put it face down onto the table to put them into neat piles. But the Polling Clerk stated we did not need to do that as it would be faster if we just leave as is, meaning scattered all over the table. There was 4 (four) of us and would not have taken us that long to do that. That would have been more efficient. As stated earlier, there were 3 of us individuals recording all the votes cast for each of the 32 (thirty-two) individuals who were running for the 6 (six) Councillor positions. I had a total of 12 candidates on my tally sheet. It took us approximately over 4 (four) hours to finish and we were not given any break in between. Carlos asked for a break and the recording of his tally sheet was taken over by the other Polling Clerk and he came back to finish. After we finished recording all the ballots for the votes cast for all the Councillor Candidates, I asked for a break to go bathroom before we started doing the final tallying of all of the votes recorded on our tally sheets. I thought the Polling Clerk would have waited until I got back. But when I got back to the table, Rhonda Wade had taken over where I was sitting, and she was calculating the total vote count of all the votes cast that I had marked off on my tally sheet. I am uncertain who instructed her to do this or whether she took the initiative to do so on her own accord. I tried to intervene, but I was totally ignored by the Polling Clerk. Thus, my Tally Sheets were not sufficiently protected by the Polling Clerk while I was gone. So, I was not the one who did the final tally of all votes cast for each Councillor Candidate on my tally sheet. And I never seen my tally sheet after that, nor did I see the final count for each of the candidates that were on my list. After working on my tally sheet for 4 hours or so, I began to get some idea the total votes each candidate received, from the highest to the lowest votes. Everything was so chaotic when I got back to the table, so I left and went and watched from afar. There were so many people just hovering and flocking around the Polling Clerk at the table while she was trying to calculate the final vote count of each Councillor candidate. She was not given the space or time needed to do her calculations and at one point I heard her say "please give me some room." It was at this point I believe that the Polling Clerk lost control of the space and the proper time needed to get the proper final vote count. The Polling Clerk was unable to perform her duties in an efficient and effective manner because of the chaotic environment. The main problem she was having was matching the total ballots cast with the total numbers of votes each candidate got. Thus, because of the chaotic environment, there was definitely a high risk for miscalculations

of votes for the Councillor candidates. Section 6.4 (a) (iv) says that the Electoral Officer has the responsibility for the protection and maintenance of ballots, the List of all Electors and all other documents and information in relation to an Election. Another responsibility the Electoral Officer has is the supervision and being responsible for all persons appointed by him/her as per s. 6.4(a)(i) of the FLFNS Election Code. So, in this instance, the Polling Clerk was responsible for the supervision of us, the Tally Recorders, as we were appointed by her. Rhonda Wade was not one of the appointed tally recorders for the Councillor Candidates, so the Polling Clerk breached her duty to be responsible for any persons appointed by her which was me, Esther Moyah, when she allowed Rhonda Wade to take over my duty in the final tallying of all the candidates on my Tally Sheet. Like I said earlier, I never seen my final tally sheet count until I seen the Tally Sheets Ruby Quinney submitted as evidence for her appeal. And they were some miscalculations in those tally sheets (refer to Ruby Quinney's Evidence Appeal Submission). Further, the Polling Clerk failed her duty to protect and maintain the ballots by carelessly leaving them strewn all over the table, rather than having them stacked right in front of her where all could see. Thus, she was negligent in her duty to protect the ballots. Furthermore, she failed to protect my tally sheets when I left to go washroom, so she breached her duty to protect "all other documents and information relating to an election" as per s. 6.4(a) (iv) of the FLFNS election Code.

CONCLUSION

I believe on reasonable and probable grounds that there were various sections of the FLFNS Election Code that were violated by the Electoral Officer of One Feather that directly affected the outcome of the Election, specifically:

- 1. **Section8.6(a):** The Electoral Officer seriously breached **s. 6(a)** by not having at least one elector and/or Candidate and Scrutineers present in the counting of the electronic ballots for the 6 (six) Councillor positions as that required.
- 2. Section 8.5.3(b): The Electoral Officer violated s. 8.5.3(b) by mainly relying on online technology to deliver instructions on how to electronically vote to eligible electors and breached the 14 days notification needed to notify the electors on the days when electronic voting was to take place. Thus, prevented some electors, both on and off-Reserve who have no online services at their homes to cast their ballots.
- 3. Section 8.5.3(c)(vi): The Electoral Officer breached this section by not requiring a picture ID of an eligible elector's status card or any other government picture ID. Electors were only asked for their status number to vote and that is not sufficient identification.
- 4. **Section 6.6 (a)(i)(II):** The security and integrity of the Polling Station was seriously compromised during the counting of votes. The Electoral Officer violated this section by not removing the individuals that interfered her ability to properly administer the Election in a professional manner which this section empowered her to do.

- 5. Section 8.1: It is not clear which individuals were the appointed Scrutineers as only the Electoral Officer knows who they were from a list provided by the candidates prior to Election Day. But if they were part of the group that interfered with the operation of the Polling Station, the Electoral Officer breached her duty by not to removing that individual from the Polling Station.
- 6. Section 6.4 (a)(i)(iv)(vii): The Polling Clerk failed:
 - (a) her duty to be responsible for any persons appointed by her when she allowed another individual to take over my duty to do the final tally.
 - (b) her duty to protect and maintain the ballots by carelessly leaving them strewn all over the table; and
 - (c) her duty to protect all pertinent election documents, the tally sheets.
 - 7. Section 6.3(a)(i): The Electoral Officer must uphold and abide by all the requirements and procedures set out under the FLFNS Election Code to conduct the Election in an ethical and fair manner. But because of the various sections that were breached, the Electoral Officer was negligent in her/duty to perform the election in an ethical, fair, and professional manner.
